Driven by the desire to make an active contribution to developing the careers of photographers from every generation, the museum, directed by Nathalie Herschdorfer, supports contemporary creation in particular with the Prix Elysée. Discover the work of the eight photographers nominated for the Prix Elysée 2025 at Paris Photo, where Photo Elysée is taking up residence as an institutional partner.

Prix Elysée

Since it was launched in 2014, the Prix Elysée has been awarded to five photographers: Martin Kollar, Matthias Bruggmann, Luis Carlos Tovar, Kurt Tong and Debi Cornwall. Winner in 2023 for her project Model Citizens, Debi Cornwall presented her work in a book published by Radius Books and Textuel, and showcased it in a highly acclaimed exhibition at the Rencontres d'Arles.

This biennial prize, worth CHF 80,000, rewards a mid-career photographer for an original series. In 2024, eight photographers, selected from among more than 750 applications from all over the world, each received the sum of CHF 5,000 to launch their project: Hannah Darabi, Roger Eberhard, Rahim Fortune, Camille Gharbi, Samuel Gratacap, Seif Kousmate, Felipe Romero Beltrán and Anastasia Samoylova.

An international jury will select the winner in 2025, who will have one year to complete her or his project and publish a book. The Prix Elysée is the result of an exclusive partnership with Parmigiani Fleurier.

Photo Elysée

Currently, a major retrospective is devoted to the great Japanese photographer Daido Moriyama. At the same time, Photo Elysée is paying tribute to Sabine Weiss, whose entire collection of photographs has been donated to the museum.

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THE EIGHT NOMINEES FOR THE PRIX ELYSÉE 2025

Hannah Darabi (IR, 1981) - Why Don't You Dance?

Born in Tehran, the artist-photographer Hannah Darabi studied there at the Faculty of Fine Arts, then at the University of Paris VIII-Vincennes-Saint-Denis. Today based in Paris, her country of origin remains the main subject of most of her photographic series. In order to reveal the complex political situation of this country, she creates series in which her photographs interact with other media, such as texts, archival images or objects.

Roger Eberhard (CH, 1984) - Meanwhile

Born in Zürich, the Swiss photographer Roger Eberhard studied photography at the Brooks Institute in Santa Barbara, California, and at Zürich University of the Arts. After 13 years in the United States, Canada and Berlin, he moved back to Switzerland in 2017. His projects often deal with forms of governmentality, depict artificially contrived, stage-like settlements and reflect his interest in political geography.

Rahim Fortune (US, 1994) – The Cove

Visual artist and educator from the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma, United States, Rahim Fortune uses photography to ask fundamental questions about American identity. Focusing on the narratives of individual families and communities, he explores shifting geographies of migration and resettlement and the way that these histories are written on the landscapes of Texas and the American South.

Camille Gharbi (FR, 1984) – Intimes convictions


French photographer and visual artist Camille Gharbi has an artistic practice that focuses on contemporary social issues explored over the long term, including gender-based violence and co-existence, examining the ambivalence of human nature. Somewhere between documentary and conceptual photography, her approach questions the state of the world, playing on distance and aesthetics to evoke empathy and sensitivity. Seeing art as a vehicle for transformation, the intimacy and subjectivity of her pictures encourage a more politicised vision.

Samuel Gratacap (FR, 1982) – Welcome Europa

French photographer whose work spans documentary photography and photojournalism photojournalism, Samuel Gratacap is interested in the phenomena of migration and places of transit generated by contemporary conflicts. His projects are the result of long periods of immersion, taking the time needed to understand the complexity of situations and to restore that which, beyond numbers, flows, maps and geopolitical data, constitutes the heart of the matter: trajectories and personal experience.

Seif Kousmate (MA, 1988) – Men vs Fathers

Born in Essaouira, Seif Kousmate is a visual artist living in Tangier, Morocco. In 2014, he quit his career in civil engineering and bought his first camera at 26. As a self-taught artist, he began his photographic journey by exploring documentary photography, with the aim of capturing the diverse realities of marginalization in Africa. His artistic practice has evolved over the past ten years by progressively pushing the boundaries of photography at the intersection with contemporary art.

Felipe Romero Beltrán (CO, 1992) – A Body That Speaks As a Bird

Photographer originally from Colombia, Felipe Romero Beltrán is currently based in Paris. His artistic endeavours are deeply rooted in exploring social issues, with a particular focus on the tension that arises from the introduction of new narratives within the realm of documentary photography. Felipe Romero Beltrán's practice is characterized by its commitment to long-term projects, accompanied by research on the context of his work. He pursued his academic journey with an interest in photography, culminating in a PhD in 2024.

Anastasia Samoylova (US, 1984) – Transformations

Russian-born American artist Anastasia Samoylova focuses on visualizing climate action in her latest project, Transformations. Since moving to the U.S. in 2008 and later to Miami in 2016, Samoylova's work has centered on environmental and cultural shifts. Her project FloodZone explored coastal vulnerability to rising sea levels. In Transformations, she documents climateadaptive architecture, green energy, and infrastructure that offer hope for our warming planet, emphasizing the necessity for collective action to address urgent climate risks. Her exhibition Floridas: Anastasia Samoylova and Walker Evans is currently on view at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.
