In 2025, Photo Elysée will be giving pride of place to youth while presenting the diversity of its collection. Since it was established 40 years ago, the museum has testified to its unfailing commitment to every generation of photographer. At the heart of its programming this year, it will be showcasing Generation Z – young creators offering their vision of the world.

Tyler Mitchell. Wish This Was Real March 28 – August 18, 2025

Regarded as one of American photography's rising stars, Tyler Mitchell (US, 1995) brings together ten years of work in this exhibition. In 2018, at the age of 23, he made his highlyacclaimed entrance into the world of fashion photography by photographing the singer Beyoncé for American Vogue, becoming the first African-American photographer in the famous magazine's history to shoot the cover. Since then. Mitchell has emerged as a leading voice of his generation. His photographic language, which stands out with its palette of rich and vibrant colours, is instantly recognisable. Switching between art and fashion, the 30-year-old artist takes intimate portraits and stagings celebrating the beauty of his Black subjects. Through his portraits, video installations and works printed onto unusual supports including mirrors and textiles, he breathes fresh life into visual representation in both portraits and fashion photography.

Wish This Was Real is the first exhibition in Switzerland devoted to the artist. It retraces almost a decade of creation and highlights instants of human connection, family ties and play, resonating with the history and cultural realities of the Southern United States. Organised and produced by the C/O Berlin Foundation in collaboration with Tyler Mitchell Studios, the exhibition, curated by Brendan Embser and Sophia Greiff, will be making a stopover in Lausanne after showing in Berlin and Helsinki. Sport in Focus. Collections of the Olympic Museum and Photo Elysée March 28 – August 18, 2025

For over a century, major sporting events have been accompanied by images. With the boom in amateur photography in the late 19th century, coinciding with the first modern Olympic Games in 1896, photography and sport have, in many ways, evolved together. Sport in Focus reveals the vast photographic collections of the Olympic Museum and Photo Elysée. The exhibition, which was unveiled at the Rencontres d'Arles for the Paris 2024

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Games, explores a largely unshown photographic heritage, offering us a narrative that shines the spotlight on sports photography.

Sport in Focus is currently featured in a "prologue" exhibition at Lausanne train station, showcasing photographs of the Paris 2024 Games.

The second part of the exhibition will be on display at the Olympic Museum in May 2025.

Photographic Survey of the Canton of Vaud. Six Photographers' Perspectives June 28 – September 28, 2025

With the aim of producing photographic documentation of its living traditions, which are included in the inventory of the Vaud's intangible heritage, the Canton of Vaud has entrusted six photographers, selected by competition, to produce original projects. In this exhibition, Thomas Brasey, Olga Cafiero, Sarah Carp, Matthieu Gafsou, Yves Leresche and Romain Mader reveal the result of their photographic investigation before their pictures become part of Photo Elysée's collection.

Gen Z: Shaping a New Gaze. September 19, 2025 – January 11, 2026

Every five years, the museum opens its walls to the photographers of tomorrow. In 2025, reGeneration will bring together the work of primarily Generation Z photographers, commonly defined as those born between 1995 and 2010, from around the world. Focused on the plurality of identity, Gen Z highlights the concerns of a generation, regardless of origin or nationality. These concerns range from the shifting and unstable nature of home and family to intersectionality, gender, and the diasporic perspective. The photographers participating in this major collective exhibition, new talents proposed by photography experts from all over the world, will unveil the world as they see it.

L is for Look. Children's Photobooks September 19, 2025 – January 11, 2026

This exhibition looks at the place of photographic images in publishing for young people. The project takes visitors on an unprecedented journey through the children's photobook, from its rise in the 1930s with the development of new teaching methods that used photography as a universal language rather than text, right up to the present day. Celebrating children's books, the exhibition will offer families various playful and educational activities. Co-produced by the Institut pour la photographie de Lille and Photo Elysée, the exhibition will be showcased in six European venues following

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
its debut in Lausanne.

Gloria Oyarzabal × Lehnert & Landrock. Revisiting A Colonial Archive October 30, 2025 – February 2, 2026

In resonance with the Vallotton Forever exhibition at the MCBA and in collaboration with Spanish artist Gloria Oyarzabal, whose USUS FRUCTUS ABUSUS series is inspired by Félix Vallotton's painting La Blanche et la Noire, Photo Elysée offers a reinterpretation of the archives of the Lehnert & Landrock studio, active in North Africa in the early 20th century.

Plateforme 10

Strategically located a stone's throw from Lausanne's train station, Plateforme 10 is a multidisciplinary arts district, one of the few of its kind in Europe. Since 2022, the site brings together three museums, the MCBA - the Cantonal Museum of Fine Arts, the mudac the Museum of Contemporary Design and Applied Arts, and Photo Elysée – the Cantonal Museum for Photography, devoted respectively to the fine arts, design and photography, housed in two iconic buildings.
